PURPOSE AND OUTLINE

Course Overview

This course is designed to provide students with the knowledge, skills, and methods for conducting community health assessments to identify factors that affect the health of a population.

Relation to Program Outcomes

Course Objectives

By the end of the course students should be able to:

1. Explain the purpose of conducting community assessments and public health surveillance.
2. Work as a group to create a comprehensive plan for conducting a community assessment.
3. Develop partnerships with community members, organizations, and stakeholders.
4. Determine appropriate assessment methods.
5. Develop instruments for data collection, both quantitative and qualitative. Demonstrate the skills necessary to develop instruments that are IRB and community approved.
6. Conduct primary and secondary data collection and analyses.
7. Report findings from an assessment.
8. Communicate findings to stakeholders.

Instructional Methods

Lectures and readings will provide the basic instruction for this course. Learning will be practiced and refined through assignments, classroom activities and classroom discussions. Quizzes will be utilized to gauge learning. Readings should be completed in advance of class as they will inform classroom discussions and quizzes. You are expected to actively participate in the class as such participation fosters a rich course experience for you and your peers. These expectations also apply to guest lecturers (if any).

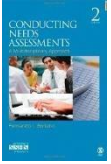

Recording Within the Course:

Students are allowed to record video or audio of class lectures. However, the purposes for which these recordings may be used are strictly controlled. The only allowable purposes are (1) for personal educational use, (2) in connection with a complaint to the university, or (3) as evidence in, or in preparation for, a criminal or civil proceeding. All other purposes are prohibited. Specifically, students may not publish recorded lectures without the written consent of the instructor.

A “class lecture” is an educational presentation intended to inform or teach enrolled students about a particular subject, including any instructor-led discussions that form part of the presentation, and delivered by any instructor hired or appointed by the University, or by a guest instructor, as part of a University of Florida course. A class lecture does not include lab sessions, student presentations, clinical presentations such as patient history, academic exercises involving solely student participation, assessments (quizzes, tests, exams), field trips, private conversations between students in the class or between a student and the faculty or lecturer during a class session.

Publication without permission of the instructor is prohibited. To “publish” means to share, transmit, circulate, distribute, or provide access to a recording, regardless of format or medium, to another person (or persons), including but not limited to another student within the same class section. Additionally, a recording, or transcript of a recording, is considered published if it is posted on or uploaded to, in whole or in part, any media platform, including but not limited to social media, book, magazine, newspaper, leaflet, or third party note/tutoring services. A student who publishes a recording without written consent may be subject to a civil cause of action instituted by a person injured by the publication and/or discipline under UF Regulation 4.040 Student Honor Code and Student Conduct Code.
